Q1. The K-12 Education budget is the state's largest by far, yet some people still believe that we are not spending enough. What would you do to help Idaho's K-12 students receive a stellar education?

This is a three-page answer. I believe in public education, charter schools and home schooling. I think we need a blend of the best of each. Some of the basic rules in the state need to be changed to allow better education. I think we need to establish a work ethic in students. We need to quit pushing all students to an academic end. It would be wise to have more vocational training.

Q2. Graduation rates at Idaho's four-year universities are stagnant while tuition continues to increase (with the exception of the one-year tuition freeze). What would you do to bring down the cost of higher education and help students graduate with less debt?

I believe the state higher education schools in Idaho should regroup and not be so Top-heavy with administration. I believe they need to teach more of the states values on natural resources instead of the more liberal education they are receiving. I believe the student's that graduate in a profession that they can use could potentially could get a bonus for actually going to work. This would reduce some the student debt. It should be across-the-board to the student that actually pays for his education as they goes through school.

Q3. Idaho has both an income tax and a sales tax, while five of our six neighbors have only one or the other. Idaho also has high property taxes. What changes do you suggest, if any, to Idaho's state tax structure?

I would like to serve on the healthcare committee. My expertise is in alternative care being in practice for 40 years in the state. One issue that needs take place is that patients need to be responsible for their healthcare. Paying for people with a cold or a sniffle or rash coming into the ER is not acceptable. I have contacted the Idaho medical Association and offered to work with them to make some significant changes in how we administer healthcare. They were open to my conversation.

## Q7. Criminal justice reform has become a bipartisan issue in recent years. Should Idaho explore further reforms? If so, which reforms would you support?

Yes, the recidivism rate is way too high. Also some people probably should not be imprisoned and need mental health issues dealt with. We need to have better job opportunities for people when the get out of prison. Right now is restricted because of some of the laws and stigmas people have about prison people.

Q8. In 2020, Idaho saw some reduction in occupational licensing mandates. Should Idaho continue to identify and implement alternatives to licensure burdens? If yes, which licenses should be reviewed or repealed?

I served on the chiropractic physicians examiners board for 12 years. I served under every Bureau chief including Mark Gregersen. The last 2 I have not served under. I helped reduce many of the issues within the Bureau. There are more issues that continually need to be dealt with. I have great passion to decrease loss of the Bureau.
